Throw the ball to a volunteer who would like to fill in the first line. Then have that child pass the ball to another volunteer who wants to complete the second line. Keep passing the ball until all five lines are written. Work as a team to make sure that the rhyming pattern is followed.

Writing poems can be intimidating for kids. Color poems show just how simple and enjoyable poetry writing can be. Teach children to write poetry with color poems. Poems and songs often use rhyming to create a rhythm, or a repeated pattern of sound, and sometimes poems will also tell a story. Read the Ann Ran poem with words from the -an family. As you read aloud, encourage your students to find a rhythm. Stress each syllable as it is read.
